

## The Gospel in Romans

### Part 9

#### Rom. 5:12-21

The Epic \_\_\_\_\_ of God's Purposes (5:12-17)

- In verse 12, Paul is explaining how \_\_\_\_\_ entered the world, not the \_\_\_\_\_ origin of evil.
- By the transgression of \_\_\_\_\_ man (Adam), sin invaded God's world resulting in condemnation and death to \_\_\_\_\_ men.
- This is the doctrine of \_\_\_\_\_ Sin.
- However we understand it, the point is that \_\_\_\_\_ is sinful and \_\_\_\_\_ knows it.
- So Paul shows the \_\_\_\_\_ between sin in Adam and salvation in Christ.
- By the free gift of God, Christ \_\_\_\_\_ the curse for all those who trust in Him.

The Victorious \_\_\_\_\_ of God's Grace (5:17-21)

- Not only did God reverse the curse, but where \_\_\_\_\_ reigned, we now reign over it!
- Where there was \_\_\_\_\_ in Adam, in Christ there is \_\_\_\_\_.
- Earlier we saw the contrast between Adam and Christ. In verses 18-19 we see Adam \_\_\_\_\_ with Christ.
- In both cases, the act of the one \_\_\_\_\_ the lives of the many.

The Epic Story of God's Purposes (5:12-17)

- In verse 12, Paul is explaining how sin entered the world, not the ultimate origin of evil.
- By the transgression of one man (Adam), sin invaded God's world resulting in condemnation and death to all men.
- This is the doctrine of Original Sin.
- However we understand it, the point is that everybody is sinful and everybody knows it.
- So Paul shows the contrast between sin in Adam and salvation in Christ.
- By the free gift of God, Christ reverses the curse for all those who trust in Him.

The Victorious Reign of God's Grace (5:17-21)

- Not only did God reverse the curse, but where death reigned, we now reign over it!
- Where there was condemnation in Adam, in Christ there is justification.
- Earlier we saw the contrast between Adam and Christ. In verses 18-19 we see Adam compared with Christ.
- In both cases, the act of the one affects the lives of the many.
- The Law was important, but its impact was only negative in nature.
- The Law could only count sin, not counter sin.
- Paul's whole point in verses 20-21 is that God's grace is greater than all our sin.
