- Proper <u>Theology</u> Leads to Passionate <u>Doxology</u> (11:32-36)
 - "Doxa" is the word for <u>glory</u> so doxology is the practice of giving God the glory He is due.
 - God created <u>humanity</u> to display His glory. (Gen. 2) But the fundamental human problem is that we failed to do this. (Rom. 1)
 - That's what Paul meant when he said (Rom. 3:23) that all have <u>sinned</u> and come short of the glory of God.
 - In Rom. 2, even the Jews, God's chosen people <u>possessed</u> the Law but didn't <u>practice</u> the Law.
 - In Rom. 3 all the world is silent and accountable to God, BUT NOW, the <u>righteousness</u> of God is manifest in the <u>faithfulness</u> of Jesus for all who believe.
 - In Rom. 4, we are justified (declared "not guilty" and part of the covenant family) as we exercise the faith of our spiritual father, <u>Abraham</u>.
 - In Rom. 5, we have <u>peace</u> with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.
 - In Rom. 6, we are <u>united</u> with Christ in His death and resurrection and no longer <u>slaves</u> to sin.
 - In Rom. 7 Paul defends the <u>goodness</u> of the Law but its <u>weakness</u> in our flesh.
