 - Paul quotes all three major sections of the Old Testament (Law, Prophets, and Writings) to show that bringing the nations (Gentiles) into Abraham's world-wide, rescued, forever family was God's purpose all along.
 - Verses 9-12 demonstrate that Jesus is risen to reign over all nations!
 - This is why missions is central to the mandate of the New Testament Church, declaring the Lordship of Jesus to all nations.
 - The central claim of the gospel is that Jesus Christ is Lord!
